in Longview May 14 (B&DMet). Brush's studies along the Rio Grande turned up as many as 24 Altamira, 14 Audubon's, and seven "Bullock's" orioles between Chapeño and Fronton in April. A very out-of-range ad. 3 Scott's Oriole surprised McKinney Mar. 1 in Brownsville. A Lesser Goldfinch was reported in *Jefferson* Apr. 11 (JW), and another was in *Calhoun* Apr. 24 (ME). Three Evening Grosbeaks were in Lubbock Apr. 23 (CHo).

### **Undocumented Rarities**

Several reports of rare or very rare sp. were received with insufficient or no documentation. Omitted from this column were reports of: Great Black-backed Gull, White-eared Hummingbird, Lewis' Woodpecker, Bridled Titmouse, Connecticut Warbler, Slate-throated Redstart, Golden-crowned Warbler, Blue Bunting, Baird's Sparrow, and Pine Grosbeak.

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# Idaho/ Western Montana Region

## **DAN SVINGEN**

Much of spring 1995 didn't differ from the past winter, being consistently cool and wet Although several semi-hardy species were recorded early in February, migration for other species was definitely late. Locally breeding warblers were largely absent from east-central Idaho and northwest Montana Swainson's Thrush was specifically noted as being tardy by several observers. This species usually arrives in northern Idaho and northwestern Montana by the third week in May and is widespread by month's end. Although Swainson's Thrushes were on time near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, it was notably absent from other portions of the area. By the end of May, only a few, non-territorial Swainson's had been noted near Kalispell, Montana, and the species wasn't even recorded near St. Maries, Grangeville, or Boise, Idaho until early June.

## **Loons to Ducks**

A Com. Loon was at Salmon, ID May 5 (LH). While still rare in e.c. Idaho, this species is becoming more regular there. Rednecked Grebes were again at Harriman S P, *Fremont*, ID (CT), one of the few places in s Idaho where they can be found.

After increasing locally since the 1980s, Double-crested Cormorants were finally confirmed as breeders near Kalispell, MT (DC). Six Double-cresteds were at Sandpoint, ID May 21, where the species has also been increasing in recent years (PC). Another Double-crested farther north at Kootenai N.W.R., *Boundary*, May 26 provided only the 3rd local sighting. The other two records were from 1981 (JRe).

Great Blue Herons commonly prey on mice and voles in upland fields, but the Missoula, MT bird seen capturing and swallowing whole Columbian Ground Squirrels, which can weigh up to 2 pounds, was quite unusual (KW, m.ob.). A Green Heron was in Libby May 6 (MHe) for about the 11th Montana record.

A group of seven Trumpeter Swans on Pend Oreille L., Bonner, Mar. 9-20 provided a rare n. Idaho sighting (EC). Two Greater White-fronted Geese were in Ravalii, MT Apr. 21-22 (CB), where unusual. A single Snow Goose Mar. 3 at Thompson L., Kootenai, ID (JN), and a pair May 16 at Kootenai N.W.R. (|re) were unusual, while the six farther south at Mann L., Nez Perce, ID Apr. 29 (C.B.) were expected. Ross' Geese were widely reported in w. Montana, and actually outnumbered Snow Geese on Flathead L. during April and May (DC, LHi, m.ob.). A single Ross' was on Coeur d'Alene L., Kootenai, ID Apr. 27-29 (RY, DL, DY) and seven were at Mann L., Apr. 30 (JH, MH), where

Only two Eur. Wigeon sightings were reported from Montana's Flathead Valley (DC). The species is usually much more common there in spring. In Idaho, the number of Eur. Wigeon sightings was about average. Singles were at Kootenai N.W.R., Mar. 22 (JRe), Market Lake W.M.A., *Jefferson*, Mar. 16–18 (BH, CT), and Boise Mar. 1–30 (MC, FK), and two were at St. Maries Mar. 25 (KD, DNS).

A Harlequin Duck pair May 5 by North Fork, ID provided a very rare e.c. Idaho record (LH), while four on the Moyie R., *Boundary*, ID May 27 (C.A.S.) were more expected. A new systematic survey of the Lochsa R., Clearwater, ID found 33 Harlequin Ducks Apr. 27 along 40 mi of river, encompassing one-third of the birds believed to be in the entire state (FC). Although a few Red-breasted Mergansers are seen each spring in s.w. Montana, 13 at Brown's L., Powell, were unusually numerous (JB). This species was also particularly common at A.F.R., peaking at 85 Apr. 19 (DT).

## Hawks to Owls

Idaho's 10th Broad-winged Hawk was at Cherry Springs, w. Bannock, May 2 (CT, m.ob.). Swainson's Hawks are normally rare in n. Idaho, but several were spotted this spring, including single birds by Moscow May 15 & 30 (KD) and Harrison May 22 (C.A.S.), and two birds by Genesee Apr. 30 (JH, MH). A Ferruginous Hawk was in Missoula's Bitterroot Valley May 1 (CB), where very unusual.

Up to 40 Black-necked Stilts were on Holter Res., Lewis and Clark, MT in late April (TH), 4 times the previous local high count. A single stilt was on nearby Hauser Res. during the same time period (TH, DSk). Ten Am. Avocets were in Heyburn S.P., Benewah, ID, where rarely seen (WK). A Willet put in a rare appearance near Kalispell, MT May 7 (DC). Upland Sandpiper were believed to be nesting this spring in Missoula's Bitterroot Valley (CB), which would represent a new breeding location for this declining species. Long-billed Curlews returned again to the isolated "colony" by Bonners Ferry, ID April 1 (EC). A Long-

billed Dowitcher was at Salmon May 13 (LH); like most shorebirds, Long-billed are very rare throughout mountainous e.c. Idaho. Red-necked Phalaropes, unusual in spring, were s. of Lewiston, ID May 12 (CW, C.B.), and at Mann L., May 20 (DJo).

Immature Herring Gulls lingered in the Flathead L. Ring-billed/California gull colony through May, and seemed ready to oversummer (DC). If so, they would furnish the first record for w. Montana. A first-winter Glaucous-winged Gull was at Somers, MT Mar. 14 (DC), and another was at the Fighting Cr. Landfill by Coeur d'Alene Mar. 31 (DNS). Although there are still <ten Glaucous-winged Gull records for Montana, it is likely that it will prove to be a rare, irregular winterer in the Flathead Valley, just as it has in n. Idaho. A Com. Tern at Pend Oreille L., May 21 was an unusual spring sighting (DNS). A Black Tern was at Salmon, ID May 13, where it is a rare migrant (LH).

Barn Owls again nested at Dumroese's Moscow area home (KD, ph.). The Snowy Owl which overwintered in Moscow was last seen Mar. 8 (KD). An active Great Gray Owl nest was found adjacent to a Georgetown L., *Granite*, MT parking lot (T&CT). An injured Great Gray picked up in the Craig Mountains, *Nez Perce*, ID in May suggests local breeding may occur (FC).

# **Woodpeckers to Crossbills**


Seven Lewis' Woodpeckers were noted near Helena, MT (GH), 3 times the normal count. Single Williamson's Sapsuckers were near Winchester, ID May 12 (CW, C.B.) and near Whitefish, MT May 16, where very unusual (DC). Two Horned Larks May 22 by Post Falls, ID (SHS) were noteworthy, as breeding has yet to be confirmed in the state's 2 northern-most latilongs.

A ♀ Purple Martin May 12–13 at Deer Flat N.W.R., *Canyon*, was only Idaho's 9th (JG ph., BHo, EH). A new Bank Swallow colony was discovered in Coeur d'Alene in late May (C.A.S.). The species is local throughout n. Idaho.

More stragglers from last fall's mighty Blue Jay invasion were noted throughout the Region. Montana birds included one throughout the spring in Helena (GH), and pairs persisting into May in Somers (DC) and Kalispell (DC). In Idaho, single birds were still in Grangeville (fide DNS), Boise (MC, FK), Springfield (fide CT), Lewisville (fide CT), St. Maries (CM), and Payette (GJ) until at least early May. Up to four Blue Jays could still be seen in Moscow Apr. 28 (m.ob.), while seven spent the spring in Salmon (HR), and a pair was noted in Lewiston Orchards Mar. 1–Apr. 15 (FC).

As now expected after a mild winter, several Bewick's Wren were reported from n. Idaho. Singles were by Lewiston May 8 (C.B.), Lapwai May 13 (JH, MH), Kamiah May 14 (DNS), and in Heyburn S.P., Mar. 25–May 19 (KD, DNS, WK). A Blue-gray Gnatcatcher nest in extreme s.e. *Jefferson*, ID provided a first confirmed breeding for latilong 22 (SR).

An early Hermit Thrush was killed after hitting a Missoula window Mar. 26 (PW). It is possible this was the same bird that provided a rare winter record last season. Locally rare, single Loggerhead Shrikes were at Swan Lake N.W.R., *Lake*, MT May 10 (DC, LHi) and Troy, ID May 17 (DT). The species was noted as being more common than usual in the Boise area (DJ).



A & breeding-plumaged Golden-winged Warbler brightened downtown Missoula May 28 (WKr, CTo, PW, DH, ph., m.ob.), providing Montana's first record.

Clay-colored Sparrows again returned to their localized breeding grounds in n.w. Montana but, like many local nesters, they arrived 1–2 weeks later than usual (DC). A Harris' Sparrow was unusual by Troy, ID May 5 (KT).

Three Great-tailed Grackles were by Am. Falls Dam, *Power*, Mar. 26 (TG), a new location for Idaho's newest resident. Common Grackles are regular in Idaho only in the extreme e. portion of the state, making the male at Deer Flat N.W.R., May 12 (JG, BHo) of interest.

Locally rare White-winged Crossbills were seen with Red Crossbills near North Fork, ID Mar. 7 (DSc) and Coeur d'Alene May 15 (CC).

### Addendum

Cape May Warbler is currently considered hypothetical in Idaho, but a recently discovered photograph will change that. The photo was taken by B. Kendall while the bird visited a feeder at his Dover, *Bonner*, ID home Jan. 5–17, 1980. The bird successfully survived weather Jan. 8 that included high winds and a low of 8° F., before disappearing a week later.

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# Mountain West Region

## **HUGH E. KINGERY**

The Region experienced a prolonged spring which started warm and ended cool and wet. A continuous series of cold fronts produced six weeks of cloudy, rainy, overcast skies from Pueblo to Casper. Individual birds of many species arrived on normal to early dates, but when they encountered barely leafed-out trees (and probably low insect/food levels) they stayed, and more poured in and stayed. The contrary spring produced one new species for the Nevada list and two for Wyoming.

### Loons to Ibises

A Pacific Loon reportedly spent one day at Riverside Res., Masters, CO Apr. 27 (#[Hi, DE, WL). At Walker L., NV the annual census produced 904 Com. Loons Apr. 12, on the high side (LN). The two wintering Yellow-billed Loons at Pueblo stayed through May 11 (MJ, BP). Rawhide Res. near Wellington, CO attracted a high 162 Horned Grebes Apr. 23 (RAR) and a Rednecked Grebe May 4-19 (DL, DE, RAR). Walker L. also had counts of 138 Eared and 79 Western/Clark's, considered low (LN). Counts of Eareds included 125 at Quichapa L., UT Mar. 19 and an early 20 at Rock Springs, WY Mar. 18. Counts at L/L/B/L found 1125 Westerns in April, compared with last year's spring total of 222. Anaho N.W.R., NV held 3265 Am. White Pelican nests May 25, a good start (GC, WH). The Lahontan Valley, NV census of colonial waders came up with 2000 White-faced Ibis, 40 Great Blue Heron, 85 Great Egret, 225 Snowy Egret, 30 Cattle Egret, 70 Blackcrowned Night-Heron, and 21 Doublecrested Cormorant nests. A Great Egret appeared at Devils Tower, WY May 6 (G&MS). Snowy Egrets at Fish Springs N.W.R., UT peaked at 344 (JB). At Rocky Ford, CO May 1-8 a Little Blue Heron in calico plumage stood next to a Snowy Egret for comparison (BP, †MJ). Vivid details of plumage and feeding style described a likely Reddish Egret at Jackson, WY May 29, Wyoming's first record if accepted by the Records Committee (‡B&GE). In Colorado observers identified Glossy Ibis in 3 places: one Apr. 26-28 at Cheraw (JRo, ‡MJ); two at Las Animas May 7 (‡MJ); and one at Denver May 12–13 (no description provided). Both descriptions emphasize
