
here was plenty to write about this season, as the north and south ends of the Region were well covered. We appreciate reports from visitors to Los Cabos who are not necessarily focused on birding. Highlights included the Region's first confirmed Streak-backed Oriole, Baja California's first Dusky-capped Flycatchers and Blueheaded Vireo, rare waterfowl, the return of Sandhill Cranes to the Mexicali Valley, Longtailed Jaegers in the Gulf of California, and numerous rare passerines.

## WATERFOWL THROUGH FRIGATEBIRDS

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck went unrecorded for the first winter this decade, while Fulvous Whistling-Duck sightings at Lagunas de Chametla continued from our last report: 3 on 23 Dec (IMC, RV) and one 18-22 Mar (ph. MJ1). All six of the Region's goose species were reported. Only 2 of 20 Greater White-fronted Geese, but 8 of 10 Snow Geese, were in Baja California. An imm. Ross's Goose at the Río Guadalupe estuary 17-18 Dec was relocated at Real del Mar 20 Dec-31 Jan (TJM, ph. MJB et al.). We consider many of the following whitecheeked goose reports tentative at the subspecies level, especially at the taverneri Cackling/parvipes Canada species interface (cf. N.A.B. 59: 329). Aleutian Cackling Geese (B. h. leucopareia) were at the Maneadero Plain 10 Oct (6; ph. RAH et al.) and El Descanso 3 Dec (ph., †MJI, MJB), and minima Cacklings were at Guerrero Negro 7-30 Nov (5, AG-A) and C.P.G.P. 24 Jan (1, MJI, RAE). Up to 3 taverneri were at C.P.G.P. 24 Jan-25 Feb (ph. MJI et al.) and "Lessers" at Heroes de la Independencia 21 Jan-26 Feb may have included one taverneri and 4 parvipes (†MJB, ph. TJM, DP), but we still consider parvipes unconfirmed in the Region. Lastly, up to 40 moffitti Canadas were at C.P.G.P. 9 Dec-24 Jan (ph. GR-C, GDLG et al.).

Wood Ducks were well reported, with up to 5 at the Mexicali Zoo 22 Sep-25 Feb (ph. MJI et al.), a female in Tijuana 7-16 Jan (ph. MJB, TJM), and a male record far s. in Baja California at Lagunita El Ciprés 29 Jan (ph. MJB et al.). A male Eurasian Wigeon at E.S.J.C 18-23 Jan (ph. DSC, ph. SGM) was the 2nd for Baja California Sur; 3 were found in the Region's far north. Also rare in Baja California Sur, 3 Mallards at E.S.J.C. 25 Jan (†MN, CN)



Sandhill Cranes had not been seen in Baja California for nearly 25 years, so these birds dropping in to roost at the Cerro Prieto geothermal ponds 24 January 2006 were a welcome sight. Their long necks, long bills, and especially their extensive red caps all indicate they were Greater Sandhill Cranes (subspecies tabida), which has recently become more prevalent in the adjacent Imperial Valley.

were the first found since Sep 2000. Last winter's female Garganey apparently returned to E.S.J.C., where it was seen 17–22 Mar (ph MJI). The most unusual of 9 Greater Scaup was a male at E.S.J.C. 21 Jan (†SGM). The female Harlequin Duck at La Joya 11 Nov–31 Jan (ph. MJB et al.) was presumably the same one seen there in Mar 2003 and Mar–Jun

2004, one of only 2 found in the Region. Additional rare sea ducks were 5 Black Scoters in the far nw. and Long-tailed Ducks at La Fonda 3 Dec (MJB, †MJI) and Estero Punta Banda 19 Dec–31 Jan (†MSM, LAC, AG-A). A Hooded Merganser was at E.S.J.C. 22 Jan (ph. SGM), and 7 were seen in the far north.

Notable seabird sightings included Laysan Albatrosses on both sides of the peninsula near I. Santa Margarita 14 Feb and near I. San José 16 Feb (both PAG, PJ), a *Pterodroma* petrel (probably not *Cookilaria*) just s. of I. del Carmen 5 Mar (†MG), and a Nazca Booby near Gorda Bank 21 Feb (MG). Two Magnificent Frigatebirds in the San Felipe area 26 Feb (MJB, ph. TJM, DP) were unusual so far n. in winter.

### **HERONS THROUGH TERNS**

Two American Bitterns at Lagunita El Ciprés 21 Jan (ph. EDZ-H) were the only ones reported, and up to 2 Least Bitterns in Tijuana 28 Aug-7 Jan (MJB) and at least one at E.S.J.C. 22 Jan-15 Mar (MN, CN, MJI) were in areas lacking recent records. All Bald Eagles seen were ads. in the far north: Laguna del Indio 14 Dec (RAE et al.), C.P.G.P 24 Jan (MJI, RAE), and Laguna Hanson 26 Jan (ph. GR-C). An ad. Broad-winged Hawk at E.S.J.C. 20 Feb (†PAG) may have represented the re-

turn of the imm. that was seen there in Jan 2005. An imm. on the Maneadero Plain 18 Dec-31 Jan (ph. RAE et al.) was seen by many. Twelve Swainson's Hawks were noted in s. Baja California Sur, including 3 s. of La Paz. A Merlin on the Maneadero Plain 19 Dec (ph. MII, DSC) matched the dark nw. subspecies sucklevi; previous Regional reports have been considered tentative (Monographs in Field Ornithology 3: 122). Four Sandhill Cranes (apparently G. c. tabida) coming in to roost at C.P.G.P. 24 Jan (ph. MJI, RAE) were the first seen in the Region since 1982 (Monographs in Field Ornithology 3: 123). Solitary Sandpipers were found again in the Cape District: 2 at Santiago 23 Jan (SGM) and one at E.S.J.C. 17-22 Mar (MJI).

The season's biggest surprise was 23 ad./subad. Long-tailed Jaegers in three groups in the s. Gulf, from near I. Santa Cruz to near I. Partida, 18–19 Feb (†PAG, ph. AR, PJ). The species' winter range is not well known, especially in the Pacific, but there appear to be no records n. of Panama and the cen. Pacific (Wiley and Lee, Birds of North America account). A first-winter Mew Gull at E.S.J.C. 15–17 Mar (ph. MJI) was the 2nd to be confirmed in Baja

California Sur. Disturbing was the report from Bahía Magdalena 28 Feb of ad. Western Gulls: "many... had obviously yellow legs, but otherwise looked and sounded like Westerns" (DAS). On the heels of last year's first winter record in Baja California, 4 or 5 Gull-billed Terns were found in the ne. 13 Dec-24 Jan: at C.P.G.P., Laguna del Indio, and the Río Colorado delta (RAE, ph. GDLG et al.). Up to 4 were at El Centenario 27 Jan-19 Mar (SGM, DAS, MJI). Elegant Tern was found again in the Cape District in winter, with 2 at La Paz 17 Dec (fide EP) and one at E.S.J.C. 22-25 Jan (MN, CN).

#### **DOVES THROUGH PIPITS**

The Flickers reported much on small doves at Bahía de Los Angeles. An Inca Dove 30 Jan–6 Apr (ph.) followed one there 19 Oct 1999, es-

tablishing the only records away from the northeast. The Ruddy Ground-Dove present since Oct was joined by 3 more 30 Jan, and all remained through Feb. Two at Algodones 27 Dec (KAR) were the first for the northeast. An Elf Owl at the Guerrero Negro saltworks 25 Jan (NA, VA) was nw. of previous state records; the unusual habitat suggests a wandering bird. A high count of 775 Lesser Nighthawks at E.S.J.C. 20 Jan (SGM) may have included wintering birds from the n. in addition to local residents. Up to 20 Vaux's Swifts were at E.S.J.C. 18 Jan-21 Mar (†DSC et al.). Rare hummingbirds in the s. were an imm. male Broad-billed near Ciudad Constitución 16 Mar (†MII) and an imm. female Black-chinned at E.S.J.C. 15 Mar (ph., †MJI). In the nw., wintering Costa's Hummingbirds are remarkably hard to come by (e.g., it was missed on the first four Ensenada C.B.C.s), so 7 on the coast s. to Maneadero 17 Dec-1 Apr (ph. RAH, ph. MJB et al.) was an unexpectedly robust total. The male Downy Woodpecker at Playas de Tijuana since 27 Aug was last recorded 29 Jan (ph. MJB et al.), and another male was at the Río Guadalupe estuary 9 Feb (†CGE et al.).


A Dusky Flycatcher on the Río Colorado at Ejido Chiapas #3 on 8 Mar (†MJI, MJB, RAH) provided the Region's first (presumed) winter record. A calling Pacific-slope Flycatcher s. of nearby Pachuca 8 Mar (MJB, ph. MJI, RAH) probably was also wintering, as were 6 individuals along the nw. coast (ph. MJB et al.). Baja California's first Dusky-capped Flycatchers corresponded with a banner year for the species in California: Playas de Tijuana 18 Dec–1 Apr (ph., †DSC et al.) and Ejido Chiapas #3 8–12 Mar (ph. RAH et al.). Four Tropical Kingbirds were seen in the Cape District

and one was at Ensenada 19 Dec (EDZ-H, †RAH). Wintering Western Kingbirds were at La Paz 17 Dec (fide EP) and on the road to San Antonio de la Sierra 26 Jan (SGM). A

Scissor-tailed Flycatcher roosted with Cassin's Kingbirds at Cantamar 18 Dec–28 Jan (MJI, ph. MJB et al.).

Noteworthy wintering vireos included a Bell's on the Maneadero Plain 20 Dec (TJM, ph. MJB et al.) and a Plumbeous at the Mexicali Zoo 28 Dec (KAR). Best was a singing first-winter Blue-headed Vireo, Baja California's first, at Ejido Chiapas #3 8-12 Mar (ph. MJI et al.). The winter swallow concentration at E.S.J.C. is renowned; this year's maxima included 20 Tree, 1000 Violet-green, 100 Northern Rough-winged, 25 Bank, 10 Cliff, and 400 Barn, On the e. side of the Sierra Juárez, 135 Western Bluebirds at Cañon de Guadalupe 1 Jan (BLS) was a high number for a lowland site. The season's only Varied Thrush was on the Maneadero Plain 19-20 Dec (ph. PAG et al.). A Red-throated Pipit of uncertain age at E.S.J.C. 17-22 Mar (ph., v.r. MJI) was where one wintered the previous year.

#### WARBLERS THROUGH BLACKBIRDS

Lucy's Warblers were present at Rosarito 11 Nov–28 Jan (ph. MJB et al.) and at E.S.J.C. 21–23 Jan (ph. SGM, †MN, CN). At Guerrero Negro<sub>3</sub>the returning male Black-throated Blue

Warbler was present Nov-20 Feb (ES. AG-A et al.), and near Ciudad Constitución, the returning male Grace's Warbler was present 16-23 Mar (ph. MII). The Region's 3rd Pine Warbler, a first-year female on the Maneadero Plain 19 Dec (ph. MJI), eluded subsequent searchers and so was not confirmed as the Peninsula's first overwintering bird. After being unrecorded in the fall, 2 Palm Warblers were on the Maneadero Plain 18-19 Dec (ph. MJI et al.), and one was at E.S.J.C. 21 Jan-17 Mar (SGM, ph. MJI). Up to 3 American Redstarts were on the nw. coast 18 Dec-29 Jan (DSC et al.), and an ad. female was at the Mexicali Zoo 13 Dec-24 Jan Maneadero Plain 18–19 Dec returned for at least its 5th winter (RAE, LAC, MJI). Summer Tanager was unrecorded in Baja California in fall 2005, but 8 were found this season, including 3 at the Mexicali Zoo. A female Western Tanager at the zoo 24 Jan (RAE, ph. MJI) was the first in the ne. in winter; 7 were seen in the northwest.

Sparrows of interest included 2 Clay-coloreds on the Maneadero Plain 19 Dec (ph.

MJI et al.), a Black-chinned in nearby Arroyo San Carlos 1 Jan (DSC), up to 3 Grasshoppers at E.S.J.C. 19–20 Jan (ph. DSC, ph. SGM), a Swamp at Real del Mar 3 Dec–16 Jan (ph. MJI, ph. MJB, TJM), White-throateds at Punta Banda 18–19 Dec (ph. MJB, TJM) and the Maneadero Plain 19 Dec (MJI), and a singing ad. pugetensis White-crowned at El Descanso 3 Dec (ph., †MJI, MJB). Two Rose-breasted Grosbeaks were in the nw., another was at Ejido Lagunero 1 Jan (NA, VA), and 2 were in the far south. Up to 60 Tricolored Blackbirds at Laguna Hanson 4 Dec–27 Jan (ph. GR-C et al.) were the most ever reported in the mountains.

Yellow-headed Blackbirds are seldom found in the Cape District, but up to 150 were at E.S.J.C. 17–21 Mar (ph. MJI). A female Bronzed Cowbird at Lagunas de Chametla 19 Mar (ph. MJI) was in an area where one or more females were seen on 25 Jan and 7 Oct 2005. The season's only Orchard Oriole was an ad. male at Playas de Tijuana 18 Dec–8 Jan (†DSC, ph. MJB et al.). Northerly female Hooded Orioles were at Ensenada 19 Dec (†RAH, EDZ-H) and Tijuana 3 Mar (MJI, MJB). A Streak-backed Oriole (possibly an ad. female) at Miraflores 22 Jan (ph., †SGM)

was an overdue first for the Region (cf. Monographs in Field Ornithology 3: 191). Baltimore Orioles were found at the Mexicali Zoo 28 Dec–25 Feb (KAR, ph. MJB et al.), the first for

the ne., and in the Cape District at Santa Anita 19 Jan (ph. DSC).
