Our president, Theodore A. Beckett, III, is from Charleston, South Carolina now, but grew up on a farm on nearby Johns Island. Ted majored in horticulture at Clemson University and has been Nursery Manager at Magnolia Gardens for the past twenty-six years. He is married and has three daughters. Since 1949, when he was issued banding permit No. 6741, he has banded over 100,000 birds — many of them colonial nesting species. Ted has made two trips to Churchill, Manitoba, to study the natal down of the many nesting species — one of his major interests.

For over twenty-five years the Brown Pelican has been a special study of his. The Painted Bunting, night herons, the Cattle Egret, and, until recent years, the Red-cockaded Woodpecker have been his special study species. While he is still able, Ted spends long hours in the field; when he is no longer able to do this, he plans to publish the accumulated knowledge from his numerous field notes, banding records and recoveries. He considers all of nature to be a part of a whole, to which man in spite of his many efforts, will never secure an entire grasp of its interwoven relationships.

### EBBA Conference—Spring 1975

A grand time was had by all

The joint annual meeting of EBBA-NEBBA was hosted by the Mid-Atlantic Bird Bander's Group (MABBG) at the National 4-H Center, Chevy Chase, Maryland, 9-11 April 1976. Festivities began with an all-day Open House at Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Laurel, Maryland. The Bird Banding Laboratory (BBL), Electronic Data Processing (EDP), and Migratory Non-game Bird Studies conducted tours of their facilities. Two tours were taken to the Bottomland Forest on the Center. The banders (117 on Friday and 29 on Sunday) toured the BBL and, hopefully, many gained an insight into the work done at the laboratory. Refreshments were provided by the BBL staff and MABBG. Registration was handled by the local committee at the 4-H Center. Workshop manuals and other items were on sale in the exhibit area. Many banders shared their traps, feeders, holding cages, techniques, photographs. etc. in the exhibits. All of the main activities (except workshops and meals) were held in one large room. This allowed ample opportunity to visit with fellow banders, view the exhibits, exchange ideas. and discuss banding in general.

Members and guests enjoyed a slide presentation on Friday evening while the two councils "slaved" at their respective meetings. Claudia Wilds shared her adventures with the "Birds of the Falkland Islands, South Georgia, and the Antarctic Peninsula." A reception was held after the presentation and refreshments were served.

Saturday dawned bright and early! As local chairman I welcomed EBBA and NEBBA on behalf of MABBG. Chris Rose, President of EBBA, and Jim Seamans, President of NEBBA, accepted the welcome. The rest of the day was spent learning from one another through workshops and paper presentations. WORKSHOPS — How to Set Up and Operate a Raptor Banding Station, and Identification, Aging and Sexing of Raptors (Bill Clark). General Aging and Sexing Techniques for Beginners (Kathy Klimkiewicz). A Simple System for Recording Molts (Trevor Lloyd-Evans). Waterfowl and Game Bird "Wing Bee" (Elwood "Woody" Martin). Analyzing Migration Data (Chan Robbins). Identification, Aging and Sexing of Finches and Sparrows (Dave Holmes and Kathy Klimkiewicz). Identification, Aging and Sexing of Warblers (Dave Bridge). Analyzing Recovery Data (Paul Woodward).

**PAPERS** — 1975 Banding Activities at Two Vermont Localities (Sally Laughlin). Preliminary Growth Studies on Nestling Purple Martins, and A Simple Capture Technique for Nesting Purple Martins (Paul Jung and Kathy Klimkiewicz). Use of Bird Banding Data in Studies of Avifaunal Composition of Fragmented Forests (Bob Whitcomb). Analysis of a Neighborhood Flock of Starlings (Hannah Suthers). Report from the Bird Banding Laboratory (George Jonkel).

Both EBBA and NEBBA conducted annual meetings on Saturday and a field trip to view the Boehm Porcelain Exhibit was held for banding "widows and widowers". Everyone was encouraged to "squeeze in" a few moments to take the bird quiz.

Saturday evening was the culmination of a fine day and began with an informal social for everyone. The banquet was attended by 195 registrants and guests. Door prizes were given away and the winners of the bird quiz were announced. Pete Pyle took the honors for the second year and Glen Mahler was a close runner-up. Chris Rose officially stepped down from the EBBA presidency and
