

Our first-ever meeting in Utah will be co-hosted by Drs. Keith Dixon, Martha Balph, and James Gessaman of Utah State University.

One of the highlights of the meeting will be an all-day field trip to 65,000-acre Bear River Migratory

#### 23-24 April 1977 Logan, Utah

Bird Refuge — the oldest federal bird refuge in the United States. It has been called one of the greatest of the migratory bird refuges in the world, mingling as it does birds from both the Pacific and Central Flyways. It is equally famous for its breeding bird colonies, such as the 7,000 pairs of Avocets conservatively estimated to nest there. White Pelicans, which breed at Great Salt Lake, make a daily 100-mile round trip to feed at the refuge.

Papers sessions and business meeting will be held in the morning and afternoon on Saturday, 23 April. The Saturday evening banquet will feature a special program.

Details regarding registration, accommodations, and meals will be sent to members at a later date.



#### WHO IS ...?

Our president, Dr. Charles T. Collins, is an Associate Professor of Biology at California State University, Long Beach. Originally from New Jersey, Charlie arrived in California in 1968 via educational waystations in Massachusetts, Michigan and Florida. Although he has conducted studies of a variety of birds, his main research interest has been in the breeding biology and ecology of swifts. His papers on these fascinating, and at times frustrating, birds have appeared in the pages of Western Bird Bander, EBBA News and NABB as well as a variety of other ornithological journals.

His pursuit of swifts has involved frequent trips to tropical areas of the world where these birds are most abundant and least well studied. This has resulted in his spending extensive periods of time in such exotic places as Trinidad, Venezuela and India to mention a few. Side trips to observe birds have also been worked in to Australia, Switzerland, England and, most recently, the Galapagos Islands.

When not studying swifts in some far-flung locale, he is usually fully occupied with teaching duties at CSULB and the direction of graduate students, several of whom utilize banding as part of their thesis research. His teaching assignments are principally in the areas of ornithology and field ecology. Charlie has also found time to be involved with a variety of other activities including officerships in the local Audubon Society chapter and membership on two U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Endangered Species Recovery Teams (for Light-footed Clapper Rail and California Least Tern). All of which adds up to a busy, at times frantic, but always interesting life style.



## Auxiliary marking authorizations

Beginning with this issue, two changes will be made in the format of "Auxiliary Marking Authorizations" — inclusion of the general locality where projects are being conducted, and exclusion of the specific colors included in a given authorization. These changes will hopefully enhance the main goal of this feature, that of promoting informational exchange among banders working on the same or similar species, or among those using

similar marking techniques. At the same time, the increasingly complex editorial task of reporting new and amended authorizations will be greatly reduced.


Sightings of marked birds should be reported directly to the Bird-Banding Lab, which will notify the bander responsible.

Wing Measure: 15cm and 30cm Stainless Steel Rule. The 15cm rule is metric/English, rigid, <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" wide, graduated in 10ths and 32nds inch, .5mm, mm, and cm. The 30cm model is spring-tempered, satin-chrome finished, 12.7mm wide, .33mm thick, 30cm long. It is graduated on one edge in mm, one edge .5mm, English on the reverse side. Both rules feature a stainless steel "bend-of-wing" fixture secured at right angles to the end of the rule. The 15 cm rule is 6.30 ppd.; the 30cm rule is 15.50 ppd. within U.S.A. McCamey Chickadee Trap: \$9.00 F.O.B. Eugene.

This trap is precision made and is designed to take birds the size of jays, grosbeaks, and cardinals. It is illustrated in EBBA Workshop Manual #5, 1975, p. 22.

It is sensitive to birds the size of chickadees and a 5 gram weight will trip the door. The main features are the sensitive treadle, a door lock for feeding when not activated, and a large handle for a gloved hand in winter. The back is fastened on with clips for easier access in case the treadle gets worked over by a squirrel.

Hundreds of these traps have been sold to nature schools, universities, and individuals in the States and Canada over the past ten years.

Packed individually, they weigh about three pounds and are shipped F.O.B. Eugene, Oregon via United Parcel. Order from Donald E. Payne, 34886 Mathews Road, Eugene, Oregon 97405.

Banding Pliers: These 6½" long-nose pliers have holes bored in the jaws to fit standard band sizes, so as to make it quite easy to get a perfect fit. This avoids the danger of lapped bands, which may injure the leg if not corrected, and which are troublesome to remove even with good tools. There is a split pin on the top of the plier which enables the user to open a band evenly with one operation. A spring on the side of the plier provides tension to keep the opened band in the plier while handling the bird. While new banders may welcome such pliers to increase their confidence in attaching the band, many experienced banders have shown interest in the pliers in order to handle birds more rapidly at peak times.


