

North American Bird Bander welcomes articles and notes, not published in other journals, containing significant knowledge about bird banding or studies incorporating bird banding as part of the project. To assist authors and to maintain consistent high quality, manuscripts are refereed prior to acceptance and publication. Manuscripts should be submitted to the editor of the association (EBBA or WBBA) to which the author belongs.

**Suggestions to authors:** Manuscripts should be submitted in duplicate and should be typed double-spaced (including tables and tabulations of literature or of band numbers), on one side of 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" x 11" bond paper. Margins should be one inch all around. Tables and graphs should be on separate sheets. Drawings must be on durable paper, executed in india ink; all lettering should be executed with a lettering guide or marked for typesetting. Photographs should be sharp and of good contrast. Glossy black and white, or color, prints are accepted; slides are not. More than 4 or 5 photos per article are not preferred. Tables should be kept to a minimum. Generally, papers longer than 15 pages, double-spaced, are considered too long. Style and form contained in the CBE Style Manual, Third Ed. (1972) is followed; vernacular bird names are taken from the AOU Checklist, Fifth Ed. (1957) and the 32nd and 33rd Supplements thereto (1973, 1976). Reprints are available at the author's expense; minimum order is 100, and a rate schedule can be obtained from the publisher. Extra copies of issues may be purchased at \$2.00 each.




Figure 3a, top; 3b, middle; and 3c, bottom. Pneumatization patterns illustrating normal median line pneumatization (3a); and two turdid variations of this pattern (3b and c). Figure 3b represents Hermit Thrush specimens AMNH 10502 and 10561, left to right. Figure 3c represents American Robin specimens AMNH 10548, 10568, and 10530 — left to right.
