### From the President

Under any circumstance, I would be honored to serve a term as WBBA President. I am, moveover, particularly delighted to assume office at the historic moment when NABB becomes truly North American with the addition of the Inland Bird Banding Association to its sponsoring organizations. My own banding roots were in IBBA, which I joined when I began banding in Manitoba. My first banding publication was in Inland Bird Banding News (the News was later dropped from the title). That note was on a trap, a subject which my predecessor, Charlie Collins, has been urging all of us to consider for NABB. At that time, I was urged to write it by Willettta ("Willie") Lueshen, long-time back-bone of IBBA, while we celebrated the centennials of Canada and Nebraska together during the banquet at the 1967 American Ornithologists' Union meeting in Toronto. We have kept up an amiable, albeit sporadic, correspondence ever since. IBBA Treasurer, Noel Cutright, has served NABB well since the original merger of the eastern and western journals as a regular contributor to the Recent Literature section, and also by abstracting NABB papers for the Auk. Thus, my personal welcome to IBBA into the publishing partnership of EBBA, IBBA, and WBBA is extended with special warmth.

Members of WBBA who attended our joint meeting with the Cooper Ornithological Society (COS) in Logan, Utah will wish to join me in extending heartfelt thanks to Keith Dixon and his hard-working committee for their hospitality and efforts in bringing a truly successful conference to completion. WBBA particularly appreciated Dr. Dixon's consent to our "tagging along" on short notice. Next year we shall be joining COS again, this time in New Mexico, with the gracious consent of J. David Ligon. We intend to be more visibly involved at that meeting, details of which will be announced later. I am also investigating possibilities for future meetings—ideas from other members are welcome!

I would be remiss if I did not close these remarks by thanking members of the outgoing executive for their contributions over the last year. Special thanks must be extended to Shirley Spitler, our former Treasurer, for serving again as Acting Treasurer while Jane Church was in Sri Lanka. The dedication of Charlie Collins is exemplified by his serving another term as President while also performing the arduous task of COS Treasurer. Charlie was President when I first joined WBBA in 1972, and held that post until 1974, and again from 1976 until 1978. Obviously, WBBA owes much to Charlie, who continues to serve on the editorial advisory board and as Worksheets Editor. Thanks, Charlie, from all of WBBA for a decade of dedication!

## Notes on the history of WBBA

Volume I, No. 1, of "News From The Bird Banders" is dated January, 1926. This newsletter served to disperse information among the members of the Western Bird Banding Association, carrying items similar to today's publication. The first President of the W.B.B.A. was J. Eugene Law; Wright M. Pierce was Vice-president, Myrtle S. Edwards, Secretary, and Harold Michener, Business Manager. At the close of the first year of the newsletter publication, it was noted that there were 92 members, representing the following locations: Alberta, Arizona, British Columbia, California (with 74 of the total members), Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. Dues were \$1.00 a year, or \$3.50 if one wished also to be included as a member of the Cooper Ornithological Society.

For a number of years, Harlan H. Edwards was in charge of keeping track of band numbers issued to permittee members. Each early issue of the News carried a paragraph containing the admonition to "Send Edwards a Postcard." Members were asked to send to him

the numbers of the bands as received from the Biological Survey; by keeping track of these locally, banders could more quickly receive information on recoveries. And an emergency supply of bands was kept on hand with Mr. Edwards.

An ad in an early issue stated: "A supply of traps available to banders are manufactured in lots of 25 (Potter Traps) and 10 (Western Traps) and are sold to banders at cost plus transportation.

Potter Traps \$2.50 plus carriage
2 compartment collapsible
Western Traps \$5.00 plus carriage"
6 compartment non-collapsible

And in the October 1927 issue, Michener detailed a drop door and frame for any purpose — add to any style trap. He offered to supply them at the estimated cost of forty cents each. Florence Merriam Bailey's "Handbook of the Birds of the Western United States" could be purchased for \$6.00 in 1927.

Some of the bird names appearing in these early issues sound strange:

Shufeldt's Junco California Creeper Blue-fronted Jay Slender-billed Nuthatch Louisiana Tanager Willow Woodpecker

Annual Census of birds banded in the Western Province in 1926 was compiled from the annual reports of 47 banders, and showed 145 species and subspecies, and 11,445 individuals banded that year. In 1927, totals rose to 160 species and subspecies, with 18,890 individuals banded; 1928 totals were 164 species and subspecies, with 23,091 individuals. It is well to remember that all these birds were captured in traps.

Had been a full-time Professor at U.C.-Berkeley (17 years) and U.W.-Madison (4 years) before taking an appointment here at U. T.M.B. 5 years ago.

Where from A native of northeastern Ohio, but from the age of 14 had frequent associations, responsibilities, and activities in California. This started with the Three-Corner-Round Society, a non-profit pack-outfit for training boys in mountaineering and natural history in the Sierra Nevada.

How became interested in banding Has long been interested in banding, but only recently started banding activity. This was induced largely by the increasing realization that in many of his ornithological projects necessary observations and individual recognition were only possible through banding. Current banding activities are limited to a small area in Galveston, but hopes to relocate to the Far West within the next few years on a permanent basis, where has property and wishes to continue his biological studies.

Information about family Wife, Charlet, shares his interest in birds and was a member of the Audubon Society, starting long before he knew her. Daughter is majoring in Horticulture at Oregon State University, Corvallis. All enjoy knapsacking in wilderness areas and in sharing their interests in the natural world and its protection.


