Inland held a joint conference with the Northeastern Nebraska Bird Banders in Norfolk, Nebraska on the last three days of October, 1982. This meeting marked the 60th anniversary of the founding of IBBA and the 5th of NNBB, which acted as host to the meeting. Special thanks are due to the members and friends who helped make this meeting a success. The local arrangements committee did an exceptional job in planning to assure a smooth and informative paper session and a selection of early morning trips.

Nebraska is an exceptionally interesting part of the world. One can see bits of prairie and an incredible abundance of bird life. The DeSoto Wildlife Refuge provided views of migrating waterfowl. Buteos were common in the countryside. Magpies and Harris' Sparrows were features of early morning field trips. A personal treat for me was a close look at a Baird's Sparrow.

Banders seem to enjoy nothing more than passing a bird around, looking over another bander's equipment, and talking about various banding techniques. There was ample opportunity for exchange and sharing of ideas. Jane Dunlap and Phyllis Walker provided an abundance of Harris' Sparrows, Tree Sparrows, and Darkeyed Juncos to examine at Jane's banding station.


