THE 1987 ANNUAL MEETING WILL BE IN TUCSON, ARIZONA OCTOBER 9-11.

WBBA Annual Meeting - 1986

Program Highlights

The meeting was held at the Santa Barbara Natural History Museum; Dave DeSante was program chairman. The morning workshops featured two outstanding presentations from Point Reyes Bird Observatory.

DeSante spoke on 'Strategy, methods and operation of a year-round banding station,' stressing the usefulness of such a program in determining productivity and survivorship. Weather conditions of temperature, wind and rainfall should be monitored and good records maintained to allow analysis of these important factors. DeSante discussed variables affecting the total number of birds in the banding area including productivity, immigration, emigration and survivorship, and variables controlling the number of birds captured. He detailed many of the factors affecting banding techniques and emphasized the importance of a standardized procedure to produce reliable data.

Peter Pyle presented 'Recent advances in ageing and sexing techniques for selected passerines,' emphasizing the use of feather shapes and colors. He demonstrated the ease with which this technique can be applied to a wide variety of passerines with many examples. Pyle is currently preparing a collection of new and revised ageing and sexing sheets, to be available in 1987.

During the afternoon session, Bill Quay spoke on 'Passerine sperm balls,' aggregates containing over 100,000 enmeshed sperm commonly found in breeding male and inseminated female passerines. Sperm from an early inseminated ball may have a competitive advantage in the female reproductive tract over those from later inseminations, a hitherto unappreciated mechanism for possible sperm competition.

Other highlights of the meeting included a report from George Jonkel, Director of the Bird Banding Laboratory; a presentation on the Least Bell's Vireo by Bruce Peterson and the banquet program by Peter Pyle, Birds of Southeast Farallon Island.

Minutes

President Robert Tweit called the meeting to order at 11:20 am, October 11, in the auditorium of the Santa Barbara Natural History Museum.

Treasurer Howard Cogswell distributed copies of his report (see previous page).

Tweit announced the death of longtime member Don Bleitz, founder of the Bleitz Wildlife Foundation.

Editor Bill Quay reported the receipt of nine articles for NABB in 1985 and four so far in 1986. He is now soliciting additional manuscripts. All manuscripts are evaluated by two or more experienced, impartial banders, usually members of the Editorial and Review Board. The subsequent revisions are again examined by the editor and when accepted, papers are transmitted promptly to the NABB production staff. Quay expressed his appreciation to Joan Tweit for the Annual Report, Martin McNicholl for Books and Recent Literature and Martha Balph for Recoveries.

The minutes of the Board of Directors meeting, held on 10 October at the home of Betty and Richard Doutt, were summarized by the Secretary, Ruth Ogden Russell. Highlights included: 1. Acceptance of the Nominating Committee report, presented by its chairman, Martin McNicholl.

2. Review of the Treasurer's report and approval of the budget for 1986-1987.

3. Three positions to be filled: Martha Balph would like to be replaced as editor of Significant Encounters; Kerry Reese has agreed to be chairman of the Annual Research Award Committee; a volunteer is needed to chair the Director's Award Committee.

4. Future meetings: 1987, Tucson; 1988, Arcata, California; 1989, Reno, Nevada.

5. The Board voted to approve the Eagle Foundation as production manager for 1987 with the requested increase in page charges from \$5 to \$6, and to evaluate other possibilities to do the job starting in 1988. A motion passed that "no quotas are to be imposed on the number of pages in the front of NABB, extra charges are to be allocated on the basis of copies mailed."

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented by Martin McNicholl. The slate of officers for 1986-87 is:

There were no further nominations from the floor. It was moved and passed that the slate be accepted as read. Stephen Russell announced that Nora Mays is the winner of the Annual Research Award.

Joan Tweit, Annual Report compiler, thanked members for their cooperation in supplying banding data. The annual report form is mailed to over 500 banders with an 80% return. She requested that all master permit holders respond, even those not currently banding. Sub-permittees should report through their master bander.
