Herbert William Kale

(died 16 July 1995)

Herb Kale, born on 24 December 1931, in Trenton, New Jersey, was a noted environmentalist and a good friend of the Eastern Bird Banding Association. He received his Bachelor of Science from Rutgers University and a Doctorate in Ornithology from the University of Georgia. Around 1961, he moved south to Vero Beach, Florida, where he joined the staff of the Florida Medical Entomology Laboratory. Later on, he moved to Maitland, Florida, where he was hired by the Florida Audubon Society. The local branch of FAS, Pelican Island Audubon chapter, was founded by Herb. He had a broad knowledge of, and was able to convey, the environmental message to elementary school children as well as to older adults.

For years, Herb worked on THE BIRDS OF FLORIDA. He was the author and editor of a number of publications and journals and also wrote a number of articles for EBBA News and North American Bird Bander. He was also influential in advocating that the City of Vero Beach remain a pleasant town and not become like one of the crowded and over-built cities south of it. Herb Kale was an outspoken advocate for the preservation of wetlands and endangered or threatened species. In his younger years, Herb rehabilitated wildlife and was an avid bander. He was called as a consultant when NASA had its woodpecker problems--when Northern Flickers pecked away at the insulation of the space shuttle.

He is survived by two sons, two daughters, and two sisters. A memorial service, attended by his family and many friends and associates in the environmental field, was held at a local church.
