Fall migration will be well underway and a full schedule of field trips, workshops, and scientific paper sessions will provide great opportunities for all that attend. Other activities in the Shreveport- Bossier City area include SciPort Discovery Center and IMAX Theater, American Rose Society rose gardens, historic Caddo Lake, plus many more man made and natural wonders.

We are anxious to have contributed papers that deal with banding techniques or the results of studies involving bird banding. Scientific paper sessions will also be open to contributed papers based on original research on any aspect of field ornithology.

Bander's Cheat Sheet

With the many numbers, abbreviations, codes, etc., banders must become familiar with, it is often difficult to process birds in a timely and efficient manner. For those of us who do not have perfect

memories, it becomes time consuming and burdensome digging for or flipping through separate pages of Alpha Codes, band sizes, AOU numbers, MAPS codes sheets (which seem to change often) and a comprehensive Identification Guide to North American Passerines with 691 pages of data to thumb through. Our banding stations, whether on pick-up truck tailgates, folding tables, or picnic tables, are crowded enough with banding tools, balances, bands, data sheets, etc. The less we have to tote around and sort through, the better-even more so for those who band from net to net! In an effort to increase efficiency at my stations and other banding stations throughout Ohio. I took the time to create a simple "cheat sheet" or "shortcut key" which is also very useful when preparing banding schedules at the end of a strand, project, or banding vear.

I created a list of 135 species (expected in my banding area) listing family, species, AOU number, alpha code, band size and page number in Pyle. This listing fills three half-page, landscape columns of standard 8.5" x 11" paper. The remaining halfpage is formatted with two columns of MAPS codes (skull pneurnaticization, cloacal protuberance, brood patch, fat, body molt, flight-feather molt, flightfeather wear, juvenal body plumage, and disposition). For ease of use, the cheat sheet is printed or copied on the front and back of a colored piece of paper (choose a color easy on the eyes in sunlight). Print/copy the back side upside down to make it possible to flip the paper over and back for quick reference. Insert the cheat sheet into a plastic sheet protector.
