Inland Bird Banding Association 2003 Annual Meeting in Southern Illinois

The Inland Bird Banding Association's annual meeting will take place 15-17 Aug 2003 at the Touch of Nature Environmental Center on the campus of Southern Illinois University, in the midst of the Shawnee National Forest. This area is unique in Illinois, having both northern and southern species of flora and fauna and a variety of habitats including oak/hickory forests, cypress swamps, and the flood plains of both the Mississippi and Ohio rivers.

The conference activities will include banding sessions of both passerines and hummingbirds, afternoon paper sessions, evening programs, and a banquet. Housing and meals for the conference will be provided at Touch of Nature, which has both hotel and dormitory accommodations. Motels are available in Carbondale, which is 8 mi to the north of the conference site. Camping is available at Giant City State Park, which is 2 mi south of Touch of Nature,

and at several sites throughout the Shawnee National Forest.

Abstracts can be submitted for the afternoon paper sessions on topics related to bird banding and its usefulness in the advancement of our understanding of birds. Along with topics, abstracts should list the title, the name(s) of the presenter(s), address, and list of AV equipment required.
