17TH ANNUAL KLAMATH BASIN BALD EAGLE CONFERENCE

Beautiful Klamath Basin is home to over 170 species of birds, including the largest wintering concentration of Bald Eagles in the lower 48 United States, 600-1000 eagles annually. Highlights of the conference include watching eagles fly out from the Bear Valley Bald Eagle Refuge Night Roost, speakers, workshops, art and photo shows/contests, and tours including local wildlife areas, refuges, Crater Lake National Park, and Lava Beds National Monument.
