

Monthly changes in a Ruby-throated Hummingbird population in southern Illinois.

This paper reports on monthly changes in age/sex structure of Ruby-throated Hummingbirds for the years 2000 to 2005. There are eight banding sites included, with approximately 11,000 newly banded and recaptured birds. Age and sex categories are charted by month from May through September for the years included in this study, looking at both newly banded and recaptured birds banded in previous years. This

study gives insight into both site fidelity and population structure.

Outstanding Year for the Golden Gate Raptor Observatory

The GGRO had an outstanding banding year, setting a new record for both numbers and species at 2,182 raptors of 12 species banded during the fall movement at the Marin Headlands. Included in this number were new records for Cooper's Hawks (829), Sharp-shinned Hawks

(767), American Kestrels (90), Merlins (57), and Swainson's Hawks (3). We also banded a Rough-legged Hawk, only the fourth in our 24 seasons of operation.

Reasons for this outstanding banding year are not entirely clear since our hawk count from Hawk Hill, although above average, was not a record-setting year. The best explanation that we have for these results is that we had good weather during the peak flight dates, a good flight, well-tuned trapping stations, and an experienced and well-trained banding team. ("Good weather" really means lack of fog in the peculiar vernacular of the Marin Headlands raptor banders and hawk watchers.) All of these factors conspired to produce these results.
