Dear Members:

Having recently assumed the presidency of the Western Bird Banding Association, I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself and update you on the organization. Some of you may know me from the annual meetings, but many of you do not. I work for the National Park Service at Lake Mead National Recreation Area, just outside of Boulder City, Nevada. I am the park's Environmental Compliance Specialist and former wildlife biologist. My interest in birds started with a pet I had as a child, and my master's degree included a thesis on the biogeography of Mountain Chickadees.

I learned to band in the mid-nineties at a wildlife refuge and operated a MAPS station at Lake Mead for several years. Ken Burton invited me to join the WBBA Board in 2003, and I have since served as Secretary, Second Vice-President, and First Vice-President. I am really looking forward to this new role and to serving the organization in any way I can.
